

MAIL ISSUES

Around mid-July, La Entrada did not receive any mail for about 4 or 5 days. This was due to our local postal worker being off from work for a medical reason. The bigger problem is lack of communication with the Pacheco branch of the Post Office. In addition to simply not answering their phones, they have nothing in place to communicate to residents regarding lack of mail deliveries, as they do not have staff to cover for someone who is out. There were multiple posts on the social media platform, Nextdoor and the problems were certainly not limited to La Entrada or even just Rancho Viejo, but throughout Santa Fe. Apparently one could drive to the Pacheco Post Office and pick up the mail that was being held, but that was never communicated to residents.



Many people who posted on Nextdoor raising this concern contacted US legislators. I contacted our Santa Fe County Commissioner Hank Hughes, who was experiencing the same issues at his home in Eldorado as well as at his office in Santa Fe. He has been in touch with me multiple times and has stated, "since the post office is federal and our office in Santa Fe is now managed out of Phoenix, our best bet to fix things is to get our federal representatives to do something before the post office falls apart completely." He recommends that everyone (all residents) contact US Representative Teresa Leger Fernandez at https://fernandez.house.gov/contact about the issues with mail delivery and communication. Clearly, there have been changes in systems at the Post office since there was a new Postmaster General appointed last year. These changes do not seem to be improvements.

In my email to the Commissioner, I listed a variety of concerns that residents might have. Here are some with possible solutions to consider until the mail issues can be resolved. Please consider these for your own protection.

- 1. <u>Consider signing up for "Informed Delivery,"</u> at <u>https://reg.usps.com/entreg/RegistrationPortalAction_input</u> Each day you will receive an email listing mail you should be receiving. Follow prompts for setting up a login
- 2. <u>Consider moving paychecks and Social Security/Pension checks to Direct Deposit</u> with your bank.
- 3. <u>Consider changing mailed prescriptions to a local pharmacy</u>, so that time and temperature sensitive prescriptions aren't just sitting somewhere other than your mailbox.
- 4. Consider paying your utility bills directly via their website (paying online. by phone, or in person) to prevent late fees, if you don't get you bills in time, due to mail delivery service. Other places have online payments available, such as Christus St. Vincent. Simply set up a login. In a world where almost everyone does online shopping, this is the same principle. It also will allow you to go paperless. Always do this on a secure (password protected) home network/Wi-Fi, not using a cellular connection as that is not secure.
- 5. <u>Consider online banking</u>, which gives you pretty much real time account activity. Always do this on a secure (password protected) home network/Wi-Fi, not using a cellular connection as that is not secure.
- 6. <u>Consider alternative shipping companies if you have a home-based business</u>, such as Etsy, where you need to ship products to customers. It might not be the cheapest, but at least it should get there in a timely manner, plus you can also track packages online that are shipped via UPS and Fed-Ex, and likely with other carriers.
- 7. <u>Consider taking your outgoing mail directly to the Post Office.</u> If the mail is not being delivered, it is likely not being picked up either.

There may be other strategies, but these were ones we discussed. Anything that eases your dependency on the mail service until things improve are the best bet. Also, please contact US Representative Teresa Leger Fernandez about our mail issues here and throughout Santa Fe.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

- □ Water and non-perishable food for several days
- Extra cell phone battery or charger
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio that can receive NOAA Weather Radio tone alerts and extra batteries
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Non-sparking wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps

Question: Tell me about the outside light that is near the front door of my house. I can't find the light switch for it. What do I do about it?

Answer: That light illuminates your house number for first responders and others to find your house. There is a solar sensor on the side of your house that operates it. Some houses have additional lights near their garage door(s) or in their back or side yards.

You should check the light every week or so to ensure that it is not burnt out. If the light needs to be replaced, please do so with a similar type bulb that is outdoor rated and that ideally discharges a white light (taking the old bulb with you to the store is a good way to match its replacement). Please note that, according to the La Entrada Homeowner Handbook (a copy of which can be found on the La Entrada website), "house mounted lighting . . . shall not contain bulbs with wattage greater than sixty (60) watts total per fixture." (See Page 14, Article I, Paragraph 3 of the Handbook). The outside light qualifies as "house mounted lighting."

Question: Autumn is approaching and I'm not used to the high desert climate. What do I need to do now with my plants to help them survive the winter and be ready for next Spring?

Answer: Good for you for trying to plan ahead! Santa Fe's first frost date is usually around the last week of September or the first week of October, so you should plan on bringing in all of your non-cold hardy plants before that date.

In the meantime, however, continue watering your plants—especially through August, and particularly so if the monsoon rains have not been adequate. Be sure that they get a deep watering at least once per week. As August comes to an end, it is probably getting too late to do any hard pruning of your woody plants, but anything dead, damaged, or diseased on your trees or plants should still be removed as soon as it is noticed. Pruning and dead-heading perennials is fine, but do not do so to roses, as that will encourage additional growth that will not have time to "harden off" before cold temperatures arrive. With a few exceptions, stop fertilizing your plants.

In September, considering adjusting the irrigation system for the cooler weather. Your irrigation system control box can be found in the garage. Watering once or twice a week would likely be sufficient. Well-established plants should not need much water, but plants less than a year old should generally be watered one to two gallons a week. Additionally, you should clean up any fallen fruit from the yard and begin removing leaves that have fallen to reduce insect populations and disease damage in the Spring.

Shortly before or immediately after the first freeze, you should drain the irrigation system so that the underground lines will not freeze and break. Instructions on how to do so can be found on the La Entrada website - <u>http://www.laentradaatranchoviejo.org</u>

A good resource for Santa Fe gardeners is Garden Blog, published by the Santa Fe Botanical Garden (<u>santafebotanicalgarden.org</u>), which provides great tips and advice. And if you aren't sure what plants are in your yard, consider downloading the free Seek app by iNaturalist, which uses your phone's camera and image recognition to help identify plants (and other living things).

Recycling Reminders

Paper, clean plastics and cardboard can be mixed together in your recycling bin. However, No **GLASS** should ever be put into the recycle bin.

Please Pick Up After Your Pet!


